

IRISH PENSIONS INFORMATION





A. If a person is residing outside the Republic of Ireland, in an EEA (European Economic Area) Country, they should apply for an EU Pension to the pension institution in their country of residence, in accordance with the procedures of that institution. If a person does not live in an EEA country, they must apply for an EU Pension to the pension institution in the EEA country in which they were last in insurable employment.

Q. How do I apply if I live in the USA?

A. There are bilateral social security agreements between participating countries that allow people to move between countries and protect their pension entitlements and the USA is included on that list.

You must contact the Pensions Section of the Department of Social Protection in Sligo 6 months before your 66th birthday.

GALVIN ANNOUNCES SUPPORT FOR FUNERAL COSTS

Those who have had loved ones die of COVID-19 may be able to apply for assistance with funeral costs, Massachusetts Secretary of the Commonwealth William Galvin announced recently that The Federal Emergency Management Agency has announced it will reimburse up to \$9,000 in funeral expenses for those who lost a loved one to the coronavirus after January 20, 2020. Galvin said he's posted information on eligibility and how to apply for the funeral costs on his webste, www.sec.state.ma.us.

"So many people have lost loved ones to this pandemic and coping with the loss of a family member is hard enough without needing to worry about the costs of laying that person to rest," Galvin said in a written statement. Reimbursement may be available even if the funeral has already been paid for, he said. Galvin said. More than 17,000 Bay Staters have died of COVID-19-related illness since the beginning of the pandemic.

What else could we say but Alleluia!


We Are Christ to One Another

Good News about the "Public Charge" test:

In March the Biden administration announced that it will not implement the 2019 "public charge" rule proposed by the Trump administration. This rule was criticized by some because it created a "wealth test" for new immigrants and had a chilling effect on immigrant families' seeking access to health care and safety net programs. Instead an earlier version of the rule implemented in 1999 will be followed.

Under this 1999 guidance, it is safe for immigrants and their families to access health, nutrition, and housing programs for which they are eligible without fear of immigration consequences.

PUBLIC CHARGE

The Trump Administration's version of the Public Charge test ended on March 9, 2021.

USING PROGRAMS LIKE THE ONES BELOW WILL **NOT**AFFECT YOUR IMMIGRATION APPLICATION:



- Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP, "EBT" or "Food Stamps") and P-EBT
- · Women, Infants and Children Nutrition Program (WIC)
- · Food pantry, grocery, and prepared meal programs



- · Boston Rental Relief Fund
- Public housing and Section 8 assistance
- Housing aid through the Residential Assistance for Families in Transition (RAFT) program
- · Emergency Assistance shelter



- · COVID-19 testing, treatment, and vaccination
- MassHealth (except long-term institutionalized care), Health Safety Net, Medicare, Health Connector Coverage
- · Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI)



- Donations
- Any COVID-19 relief funding
- · Unemployment assistance
- · Small Business Administration (SBA) loans and grants
- · Help paying for child care

The Public Charge test still exists for some immigration applications, but it ONLY applies to these benefits:

- · Government cash benefits (e.g. TAFDC, EAEDC, SSI)
- Long-term care paid for by the government (e.g. nursing homes)

SAFE HOME IRELAND

Safe Home Ireland is an Irish emigrant support service that provides a range of services to more than 2,000 people each year. We provide an advice and information service, undertake outreach visits and provide housing assistance to eligible applicants.

Safe Home Ireland was established in the year 2000 to assist older qualifying Irish born emigrants to explore the option of returning to live in their native areas. The organisation was set up as a Pilot Project by a local GP and our current Chairperson, Dr. Jerry Cowley.



Over the years, Safe Home has evolved from simply providing a housing option for older Irish born emigrants. Our work is now spread across the 26 counties and we provide supports to our applicants at every stage of their journey from the initial enquiry abroad to actual return home.

OUR VISION: To ensure that anyone considering returning or moving to Ireland is given every opportunity to make an informed decision.

OUR MISSION: To act as the LINK for Irish emigrants both at home and abroad by providing advice, information, guidance and supports for those seeking permanent repatriation as well as those who chose to stay in their adopted country.

OUR VALUES: Safe Home Ireland is committed to working in partnership with all relevant agencies at home and abroad to offer a professional and person centered service to our client group.

Update on the DACA Program:

On Jan. 20, 2021, President Biden introduced a memo focusing on the preservation of the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals, or DACA, program. In this memo, "the Secretary of Homeland Security, in consultation with the Attorney General, shall take all actions he deems appropriate, consistent with applicable law, to preserve and fortify DACA."

DACA is an immigration program that was implemented in 2012 by the Secretary of Homeland Security. This program allows certain undocumented individuals who entered the United States as children to be safe from removal for a period of up to two years if they meet the following eligibility requirements:

The applicant was under the age of 31 as of June 15, 2012;

The applicant came to the United States before reaching their 16th birthday:

The applicant was physically present in the United States on June 15, 2012;

The applicant had no lawful status on June 15, 2012;

The applicant was in school, graduated or obtained a certificate of completion of high school, obtained a general education development (GED), or was an honorably discharged veteran of the Coast Guard or Armed Forces of the United States; and

The applicant has not been convicted of a felony, significant misdemeanor, or three or more other misdemeanors, and does not otherwise pose a threat to national security or public safety. An applicant granted this relief is eligible for work authorization, a social security number and various federal benefits.

On Feb. 4, 2021, Sens. Dick Durbin (D-I11.) and Lindsey Graham (R-SC) introduced The DACA Dream Act of 2021. This bill will provide individuals who were brought to this country as children and who grew up in the United States the opportunity to apply for lawful permanent resident status and eventually citizenship if certain requirements are met.

While the existing DACA program has been fully reinstated and U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services is required to accept new DACA applications, there is still pending litigation in the Southern District of Texas that threatens and ultimately seeks to do away with the program. Many remain hopeful, however, that the current administration will continue to make DACA a priority and create a pathway for citizenship for these individuals who have been in the U.S. since childhood.

ICOCOIGRATION NEWS

A reminder from our friends at Massachusetts Immigration & Refugee Coalition:

Remember! There will be NO immigration consequences for seeking COVID-19 testing, treatment, or vaccination. If you or a loved one are sick or know you've been exposed to the coronavirus, don't hesitate to get tested and treated, regardless of your immigration status or insurance coverage.

COVID-19 VACCINE FAQ



ENGLISH

MIRA strongly encourages everyone to get vaccinated as soon as they are eligible, regardless of immigration status. To find out if you are currently eligible and to learn more about the COVID-19 vaccine, please visit mass.gov/vaccine.



Q CAN I RECEIVE THE VACCINE IF I'M UNDOCUMENTED?

Yes! Everyone can and should get vaccinated as soon as they are eligible, regardless of immigration status. The only way we will beat this virus is to vaccinate as many people as possible, as quickly as possible, and continue practicing social distancing and mask guidelines.

Q D

Does it cost money to RECEIVE THE VACCINE?

No! The vaccine is free for everyone, regardless of immigration status or whether you have health insurance. You will not be asked for a credit card or to make any payment at any point during the process.

Q ARE THERE IMMIGRATION CONSEQUENCES FOR RECEIVING THE VACCINE?

No! There will be no immigration consequences for receiving the vaccine, or any form of COVID-19 treatment. It will not influence the public charge determination and your immigration status will be kept confidential. U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) and U.S. Customs and Border Protection will not conduct enforcement operations at or near vaccine distribution sites or clinics. There might be a security presence, such as the National Guard, but this is purely precautionary and not a cause for concern.

Q DO I NEED A DRIVER'S LICENSE, ID OR HEALTH INSURANCE FOR THE VACCINE?

No! You do not need any identification card or a health insurance card to get the vaccine. You might be asked for an ID or an insurance card when you arrive, and if you have them, you should bring them, but they are not required.

If you don't have identification, you may have to attest to your eligibility, such as confirming your age, by signing a form.



() IS THE VACCINE SAFE?

Yes! COVID-19 vaccines are safe and effective. All approved versions of the vaccine went through rigorous testing. Millions of people in the United States have already received COVID-19 vaccines under the most intense safety monitoring in U.S. history and serious side effects are very rare.

You may experience mild side effects, like a sore arm or mild fever-like symptoms, but these are normal and a sign that the vaccine is working.

Naturalization Civics Test UPDATE

U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services announced it is reverting to the 2008 version of the naturalization civics test beginning March 1, 2021.

On Dec. 1, 2020, USCIS implemented a revised naturalization civics test (2020 civics test) as part of a decennial test review and update process. USCIS determined the 2020 civics test development process, content, testing procedures and implementation schedule may inadvertently create potential barriers to the naturalization process.

The 2008 civics test was thoroughly developed over a multi-year period with the input of more than 150 organizations, which included English as a second language experts, educators, and historians, and was piloted before its implementation. USCIS aspires to make the process as accessible as possible as directed by President Biden's request to review the process thoroughly.

The civics test is administered to applicants who apply for U.S. citizenship through naturalization and is one of the requirements for naturalizing. Applicants must demonstrate a knowledge and understanding of the fundamentals of the history, principles, and form of government of the United States.

Applicants who filed their application for naturalization on or after Dec. 1, 2020, and before March 1, 2021, likely have been studying for the 2020 test; therefore, USCIS will give these applicants the option to take either the 2020 civics test or the 2008 civics test. There will be a transition period where both tests are being offered. The 2020 test will be phased out on April 19, 2021, for initial test takers. Applicants filing on or after March 1, 2021, will take the 2008 civics test.

The test items and study guides can be found on the <u>Citizenship Resource Center</u> on the USCIS website.

The current application fee for renewing a Green Card is \$455, plus an \$85 biometric fee, for a total cost of \$540 The current application fee for applying for U.S. Citizenship is \$640, plus an \$85 biometric fee, for a total cost of \$725.

MEET CONNIE MCELHENEY: A lovely reflection on his life with his wife Mary

Being one of a family of twelve in Donegal in the 30's, 40's, and 50's brings back many happy memories but also sad ones too. Emigration was the only cure so off to foreign lands we went with a suitcase in hand.

My first stop was Scotland where like many from Donegal we found a new home. Work was plentiful on building sites and trips back home in the summer and at Christmas was something you looked forward to.

In 1957 after being in Scotland for six years I decided to seek greener pastures so Canada was my next stop, getting closer to the United States with every move.

After a brief visit back to Donegal to bid farewell to my parents, family and friends and after the Irish Wake it was back to Scotland again to board the Ocean Liner "Castle Felice" from Greenock Scotland on May 8, 1957.

As I sailed past Malin Head and Tory Island I went on a journey taken by thousands before me. Saying goodbye to the Hills of Donegal fading away in the distance I settled down for nine days before reaching Montreal.

Work was very scarce at that time and being only allowed to have 50 pounds when leaving Scotland didn't help. There were no steak dinners for me in Canada. After weeks of no hope of getting a job, my cousin Peter McGaffigan came up from Boston and brought me to the U.S.A.

My aunt, Celia McGaffigan, a great lady from Leitrim, knew a friend who gave me my first job in America learning to be a meat cutter. The company was the Atlantic & Pacific Tea Company, the largest retail company in the US at that time. Eeighteen years after landing that job I went to work for the M.B.T.A. in the automotive department. I retired from the T in 1997 and have been enjoying life with my lovely wife, Mary, who I met over 60 years ago.

It all happened in that famous hunting ground of the Dudley Street dance halls. My wife Mary Ann Gallagher from lovely Leitrim made a pit stop in Boston on her way back to California in 1959. Mary was living with her uncle and working as a salesgirl at Jordan Marsh. It was love at first sight. She never reboarded the plane.

It was a fast romance, but why wait? We walked together down the aisle on October 15, 1960. We have six great children, Theresa, Neil, John, Mary, Cathy, Kevin and five grandchildren. We love them all and they are all doing well in their jobs. They live not too far away and visit us often so that is a plus.

Mary and I love travelling and have visited Australia, China, Israel, Nova Scotia, Canada and we have done the Lewis and Clark expedition route and travelled via train to British Columbia

The Donegal Association has always been close to my heart since I joined it in the late fifties. Being elected President for eight years I enjoyed working with all the members in planning all the events we ran in those happy times. Many of those great members are gone to their eternal reward. Their memories will live forever in the annals of the Donegal Association May They Rest In Peace.

One of my proudest moments with the Donegal Club was working with Michael McCarron and the members in booking Daniel O' Donnell for his first appearance in the U.S.A. It was one of the best nights of entertainment in the history of the Association.

The G.A.A. in Boston keeps my mind active in retirement with being treasurer of the North East Division for eight years and Honorary President for seven years. I also had the honor of being Honorary President of the Donegal G.A.A. It was a great honor for me to be asked by the G.A.A. Board to sing the American National Anthem on the day of the finals in Canton. I thank them sincerely for asking me to perform. Many changes have occurred in the Irish Clubs in the past sixty years. Boston had nineteen clubs in 1957, fourteen of them Irish County Clubs.

I believe this is a great idea of the Pastoral Centre to put a written program like this together. So much information is lost as we all get older and forgetful.

Back in the mid thirties the Irish Government had a program somewhat similar to this where children at school were asked to talk to their older relatives and neighbours to record their life story and write it down as homework and return it to school.

It was called Folk-Lore and those stories still appear in school books to this day.

SHOPPING IN RURAL IRELAND

When this scribe was a child my cousin and I used to cross the fields to the local shop Strogens in Cartron in the parish of Attymass. It was a room in the house and we loved to go there on messages so that we could buy sweets and enjoy them on the way home – innocent and halcyon times they were.

Some time back whilst imbibing in Foxford I met a man whose parents once owned what is now Guiry's pub on the corner of the Main Street. They had a public house and a shop on the bridge side. His mother's people had a large shop in Atty-



machugh and this was a major rural business and family – owned at one time. They sold groceries and feedstuffs and cloth and fabric too. They had a lorry or two on the road and travelling shop also.

The rural shop was once an important part of the social fabric of the countryside and people would go there not just to shop for the few commodities but they would gather news and information there as well as socialise. These shops were often only a room in a house and they sold the basic needs for the household which was largely self-sufficient at the time.

They sold tea and sugar and paraffin oil and that sort of thing and they survived the ravages of the rationing of the Second World War. The counter would be in a room and inside the door, items were on shelves on the wall inside the counter there was no self-service in those days.

The travelling shop was very important in rural parts before the mass ownership of cars. The women would bring eggs to the shop keeper and they would exchange them for groceries a form of barter and the merchant would then grade the eggs and bring them to the port at Dublin for export. This writer well remembers the travelling shops that came to our area in the 1970's with Gallagher, John Kelly before this and John Judge on the road each week Tuesday for one and Thursday for the other and this writer indeed used to travel on part of the route to help out and would get 50p to spend on sweets before the travelling shop returned to the village.

The children on their way to school would visit the shop for a few sweets or a penny or six penny bar in what was then the world of pounds shillings and pence prior to 1971. These shops were popular and widespread during the 1940's and before and up to the 1950's until the advent of the car and the larger shops in the towns and villages closed them down.

They would have string and brown paper for wrapping the goods in and this was before there was such a thing as packaging of goods. The post office in the village was a shop too and would have items for people when they came to collect their payments should they wish to buy. The shop and the post office are often in the same building today, but this does not always mean that the people use their money in the shop after using the post office, but it was that way at one time. There were shops dotted throughout the townlands and they did a brisk trade and then there were larger merchants in the nearby villages where as the saying goes you could buy anything from a needle to an anchor.

In the evenings people and the young in particular would gather in the small townland shop and they would congregate outside after having shopped for their parents and have a chat and a laugh like a scene from the song "the stone outside Dan Murphy's door."

The townland shops came to an end in the early 1960's a water shed time for the life of rural Ireland and the place was never the same again and the young left the place desolate and yet in the villages the small shops with the room survived into the 1970's and in some cases 1990's

The Government of Ireland continues to advise against all non-essential international travel at this time. Travel restrictions are in place to protect public health and to mitigate the risk of new variants of COVID-19 entering the country. Details of these measures are available on the travel section of the **gov.ie** website.

Travel to Ireland from specific designated States is now subject to mandatory hotel quarantine. As of 4am on April 15th the United States will be considered a designated State and all passengers arriving into Ireland that have been present in the US, including transit, during the prior 14 days will be subject to a period of mandatory hotel quarantine.

This must be pre-booked in advance of travel, further information on booking can be found here. These arrangements apply to any passenger who has been in any of the <u>designated states</u> in the previous 14 days, even if only transiting through one of these countries and even if remaining airside. The list of designated states can change at short notice and passengers should check gov.ie for full details before travelling.

Passengers arriving into Ireland from all countries, including the US, are required to show a negative result of a pre-departure PCR COVID-19 test taken within 72 hours of arrival in the State. Checks will be made by the Border Management Unit at Dublin Airport and by An Garda Síochána at other points of entry. Mandatory quarantine at a designated facility will be required for passengers who arrive in breach of the pre-departure negative/'not detected' PCR requirement. Children aged six and under are exempt from this requirement. Please visit gov.ie/quarantine for more information.

I SEE HIS BLOOD UPON THE ROSE

Joseph Mary Plunkett

I see his blood upon the rose And in the stars the glory of his eyes, His body gleams amid eternal snows, His tears fall from the skies.

I see his face in every flower; The thunder and the singing of the birds Are but his voice-and carven by his power Rocks are his written words.

All pathways by his feet are worn, His strong heart stirs the ever-beating sea, His crown of thorns is twined with every thorn, His cross is every tree.



An assessment of 'I See His Blood Upon The Rose' by Dr Lucy Collins

'I See His Blood Upon the Rose' is a poem in the mystical tradition, expressing the intensity of Plunkett's Christian faith. These simple verses testify to the presence of the divine in the world, reading in nature the iconography of the crucifixion. At the centre of the poem lies the conviction that Christ's suffering will never be forgotten, as long as God's word remains the bedrock of existence. Here the deeply personal becomes universal through an unworldly directness of address.

Plunkett's commitment to the revolutionary process suggests how shared intentions may find expression in individual action, and indicates the redemptive power of personal sacrifice. Yet this is also a poem about what it is to see - about the significance of the act of writing as a form of revelation. It reflects our need to move beyond the narrow confines of the self in the search for human meaning.

Dr Lucy Collins is a lecturer in English at University College Dublin (UCD). She is the curator of 'Reading 1916', a forthcoming exhibition at UCD Special Collections.



Sports News From Ireland

The GAA Releases its updated Master Fixtures Calendar for the 2021 season.

The inter-county season will run from the weekend of May 8th/9th with the start of the Allianz Hurling League, to the weekend of August 28/29 when the All-Ireland Football Final will be played. County and Provincial Club Championships will be played in the months of September, October, November, and December with the All-Ireland Club Finals scheduled for February 2022. The inter-county fixtures programme will be run off in a 20-week period and guarantees a minimum of five games for each Senior County Football and Hurling team with all bar three counties guaranteed six games in hurling.



2021 Allianz Football League: The Allianz Football League will from the weekend of May 15/16 to the weekend of June 19/20 with Divisions split into North and South as originally planned in December.

Four teams will be in each group based on geography with three Round Robin games per team. The top two in each divisional group will advance to the league semi-finals followed by a league final.

The bottom two in each divisional group will play relegation semi-finals with the two losers of those matches relegated. The bottom teams in Division 4 will play a Shield semi-final and final.

League finals will only be played on June 19/20 if counties involved are not playing in the championship the following weekend. If they are, then joint winners will be declared for Division 1 and joint winners and promotion for Divisions 2, 3, and 4. London will not be participating in the 2021 Allianz Football League.

2021 Allianz Hurling League: Divisions 1 and 2 of the Allianz Hurling League will run from the weekend of May 8/9 to the weekend of June 12/13. Division 3 of the Allianz Hurling League will run from the weekend of May 15/16 to the weekend of June 19/20.

There will be no Division 1 Hurling League quarter-finals, semi-finals, or Final played. There will either be joint winners for 2021, or or if the teams that win Div 1A and Div 1B meet in the Championship, this will double as a League Final.

The Division 1 Hurling League Relegation Play-off will be played as curtain raiser to Senior Hurling Semi Final in August.

Divisions 2 and 3 will not have League Finals either. The top team in each Division will be crowned champions. The bottom team in Divisions 2A, 2B, and 3A will be relegated.

2021 All-Ireland Senior Football Championship will be played as a straight knock-out competition from the provincial series forward. There will be no Qualifiers and New York and London will not be involved.

2021 Liam MacCarthy Cup: There will be a provincial knock-out championship with back-door qualifiers like there was in 2020, but now also with the introduction of relegation to the Joe McDonagh Cup.

There will be a preliminary round in the qualifiers between the two defeated quarter-final team in Leinster with the winners progressing to Round 1 of the Qualifiers and the losers relegated to the Joe McDonagh Cup in 2022.

MCBRIDE IS BACK!

Evander Holyfield will fight Kevin McBride after negotiations for a bout with Mike Tyson fell through, according to Kris Lawrence, an adviser to Holyfield. The eight-round exhibition match will take place June 5 in Miami on the undercard of a fight between Teofimo Lopez, the undisputed lightweight champion, and George Kambosos Jr. Holyfield, 58, will be fighting for the first time in more than 10 years and against a boxer most famous for scoring a TKO against Tyson in what was the last fight of Tyson's pro-career.

With Tyson at least temporarily out of the picture, Holyfield has chosen to fight the last man to beat Tyson. McBride scored a TKO against Tyson in 2005, when Tyson failed to come out for the seventh round.

It was the last fight of Tyson's pro career. "So if you can't fight Tyson, you got to fight the last guy that knocked him out," Lawrence said. "It's not like Evander went deep into the well and found some geriatric guy." McBride, 47, is nine years younger than Holyfield. He fought last in 2011, when he was knocked out in the fourth round Mariusz Wach. Holyfield also fought last in 2011, when he beat Brian Nielsen with a 10th-round TKO.

The Holyfield-McBride fight is scheduled for eight, two-minute rounds and will be held at Marlins Park.

IRISH JOCKEY Rachael Blackmore has made history by becoming the first female to win the Grand National.

The Killenaule-born rider secured her place in the history books on April 10, after riding to victory aboard Minella Times in the world's most famous horse race. It came as part of a memorable afternoon for Irish trainer Henry de Bromhead, who completed a memorable one-two with another of his horses, Balko Des Flos, coming in second.

Owner JP McManus also had two reasons to celebrate, with another of his horses, Any Second Now, finishing third. This triumph marked McManus's second Grand National victory, coming 11 years after Don't Push It won in 2010.



Ireland dominated proceedings at Aintree, with each of the top five finishers coming from Irish trainers and owners. Riding on the 11-1 shot Minella, the Co Tipperary rider delivered a perfect race, biding her time early on before gradually creeping up into contention as the race entered its second circuit.

Her win represents a watershed moment for horse racing and a much-needed positive story around the sport after several months of negative headlines involving Irish racing.

Speaking to the *Racing Post*, an ecstatic Blackmore was in shock at her victory. "I cannot believe it," she said. "He gave me an absolutely sensational spin. I'm so lucky to be riding him and I can't believe we've just won the Grand National, it's unbelievable.

"He was incredible and jumped beautifully and I was trying to wait for as long as I could. When we jumped the last and I asked him for a bit he was there. I don't feel male or female right now, I don't even feel human! This is just unbelievable."It was a triumph that drew reactions from across the world of politics and beyond in Ireland.

President Higgins was among the first to show his appreciation after Blackmore's historic win: "My congratulations to Rachael Blackmore on an historic achievement at Aintree," he tweeted. The win is both a personal and sporting success, and comes only a month after her groundbreaking wins at Cheltenham.
